Pastor's Message



Dear Friends:

Happy 4th of July!

In my home town of La Porte, Indiana, we are the honorary State Capital for a day because we have the largest Independence Day parade in the State of Indiana. Many people stake out their spot on the lawns along Lincolnway Avenue the night before the parade to secure a prime viewing spot. One of the best spots is right in front of the Knights of Columbus building, where being a priest I am not likely to have to pay for my beers or hot dogs.

The high point was always the beginning flyover, which was usually by military jets. One year a La Porte High School graduate flew his navy jet over the parade route lower than is permitted, and then hit the afterburners as he shot straight upwards, setting off all of the car alarms in the vicinity. I understand that he got a pretty severe reprimand for that move.

We had some amazing parade marshals, such as Clayton Moore, who played the Lone Ranger, and Sean Austin, who starred in the movie "Rudy."

As a boy, I always loved seeing the Orak Temple Shrine band with men in go-carts doing figure eights, and a sword-bearing, bare-chested, huge-bellied fellow wearing a turban. He would flash his swords in front of you and then blow a whistle and begin laughing at your frightened expression.

The parade line-up featured all that is best about our American life: numerous high school marching bands, sophisticated floats from local businesses, a parade of civic organizations such as the Lions Club and the Jaycees, Scouts carrying a huge American flag, vintage farm tractors or Model T Fords, politicians in convertibles, or various fire departments with their sirens blaring. It was two hours of homespun entertainment, featuring what is best about our nation, and everyone seemed happy to see it.

I share all of this because we seem to lose sight at times of the many blessings we enjoy in this land. It is so tempting to focus on what is wrong with our society, especially these past few years with all of the social upheaval we have faced. I sometimes worry that we define ourselves over and against one another instead of focusing on what we hold in common as American citizens.

For all of our challenges, many people in the world still look to America as a bastion of democracy, of free speech and religious freedom, as a melting pot of cultures and races, and a land of opportunity for immigrants who dream of a better life. Having lived overseas for almost a decade of my life, I know that many people in the world live under extremely bad governments who oppress and mistreat their people.

May this 4th of July lead us to a greater sense of gratitude and of commitment to the common good of all who live in this land. We may not agree on everything, but in a genuine democracy that is no reason to hate one another. Instead, we should seek to celebrate what is true, what is beautiful, and what is good about this country that we all call home.
