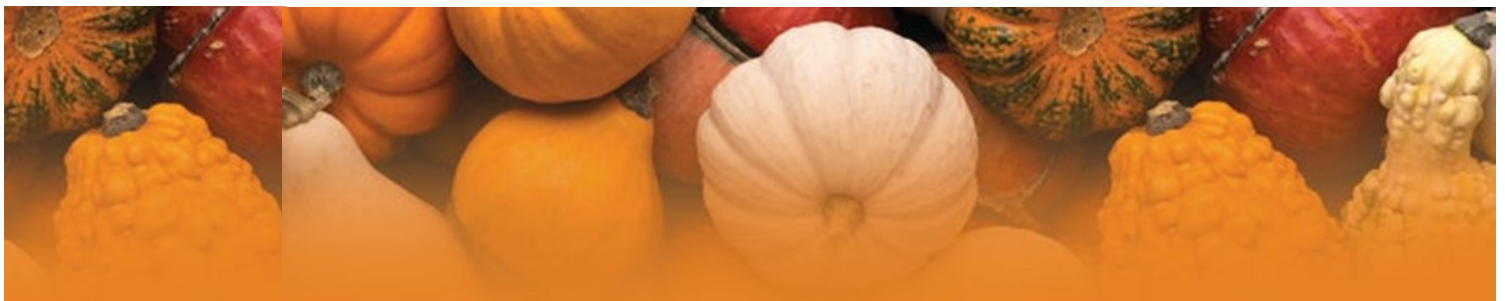

Growing in Faith

THE SIGNIFICANCE OF THE ALTAR



The altar within our sanctuary is beautiful. Crafted in 2006 from marble and inset with a border of black/white ceramic tiles which match the sanctuary floor. The altar serves as our Table of the Eucharist and matches our ambo, our Table of the Word.

Altars in Catholic churches are so important that oftentimes people refer to the sanctuary space as the “altar” even though the altar is one among many furnishings. However, the altar is the place of sacrifice, the table of the banquet feast, the reminder of the Last Supper, the focus of our worship for the second half of the Mass.

Do you notice how we bow to the altar? Lectors who enter and leave the sanctuary bow to the altar, not the tabernacle or the crucifix. When Servers, Priests and Deacon pass in front of the altar during the Mass, they bow to it, not the tabernacle or the crucifix. Do you know why?

The altar, unlike any other liturgical furnishing, symbolizes Christ. When an altar is prepared for a church, 5 small crosses are etched into the stone; they remind us of our Lord’s five wounds from his crucifixion. When an altar is consecrated, as was ours, the archbishop anoints the entire surface of it with Holy Chrism Oil, just as you would a child who is baptized, an adult who is confirmed or a man who is ordained for Holy Orders.

Just as the Book of the Gospels is unlike any other Book that we use in worship, so, too, the altar is unlike any other furnishing or piece of devotional art for the church. We acknowledge it as a profound symbol of Christ who mediates to us God’s grace and redemption. Until we see him face to face in the kingdom.

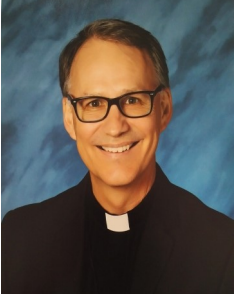

Pastor's Message



Dear Friends:

I love jokes about Adam and Eve, and I use them for wedding homilies if a couple happens to choose a reading that references our first parents. My favorite is about Adam being out hunting all day, longer than usual, and Eve was understandably concerned. When he finally returned to Eden, Eve said to him, "Adam, dear, do you love me? Do you really love me?" And Adam held her hands, looked her in the eyes, and said, "Eve, dear, who else?"

Anyone who has ever been married knows that married life is not easy. All of us, however, would agree that married life is the bedrock of both church and society. So what can married couples do to strengthen their marriage commitment and the overall well-being of their families? My advice would be to make prayer more and more the center of your family life.

Pope Francis recently issued a message ahead of the 2022 World Meeting of Families that will take place in Rome. He wrote, "Dear Friends, the family is alive if it finds itself united in prayer. The family is strong if it rediscovers the Word of God and the providential value of all his promises."

The other day I had a conversation with a parishioner who said that she finally talked her husband into joining her and her daughter for a brief prayer before they all retired for the night. They take a moment to thank God for one blessing each of them received that day and then they pray the Our Father. She said to me, "Father Pat, you could not believe what a difference such a short prayer each night has made in our life as a family."

I know that it feels uncomfortable at first to pray together. We Catholics are not used to it, but agree to something simple to get started. It does not have to be more difficult than offering thanks for a blessing received that day, or praying for anyone that you know needs a special prayer, and then saying the Our Father together. For variety, you can grab the bulletin and find one of the readings listed for Mass that day in your Bible, and have someone read it aloud. On occasion, even try praying the rosary together. It only takes 20 minutes and there are Apps that can lead you in praying it.

As Fr. Patrick Peyton, C.S.C., a Holy Cross priest who founded Holy Cross Family Ministries always said, "The family that prays together, stays together."
